SARASOTA--Six new faculty members have been named at New College, although there will be no increase in the size of the faculty, it was announced today.

All six will take the place of faculty members who are taking annual leaves or other positions.

Dr. Martin S. Eshleman, chairman of the Philosophy Department at Carleton College, will be visiting professor of philosophy for next year. During this term Dr. B. Gresham Riley, assistant professor of philosophy, will be on leave.

Dr. Eshleman, who has visited New College and lectured here, has been a member of the Carleton College faculty since 1944. He had previously taught at Yale University where he also earned his Ph.D.

Alan S. Lichtenstein has been named assistant professor of history. Professor of history Dr. George Mayer will be on leave to spend a year in India. Lichtenstein comes to New College from Fairleigh Dickinson University where he participated in planning an experimental interdisciplinary humanities curriculum for freshmen students. His special interest is in Russian history and he studied for a year at Moscow State University under a cultural exchange program.

Other faculty members:

William E. Fleischman, assistant professor of economics, holds degrees from Rutgers University and the University of Michigan. Fleischman's special interests are in labor economics and comparative economic systems and he has held teaching fellowships at the University of Michigan where he is doing research and assisting in the writing of a textbook.

Robert M. Hankin, assistant professor of Russian, holds degrees from Cornell and Columbia universities. Now on the faculty at Duke University, Hankin taught at Williams College and at Columbia, was a research analyst on the Soviet Union and a translator for the OSS during World War II. He also served as an attache at the U.S. Embassy in Moscow. He has written two works on post-war Soviet ideology.

New assistant professor of chemistry is Robert W. Harrill, who was graduated from Grinnell College and holds his doctorate from the University of California. Dr. Harrill is now a chemistry professor at UCLA and he has also done research for DuPont. He is a member of Phi Beta Kappa and won two awards for distinguished teaching at UCLA.

Jeffrey C. Wright will be a new assistant professor of political science. He earned degrees from the University of South Florida, where his father is a member of the faculty, and from Stanford University. Wright has taught at the University of Alberta, at Stanford, and he held a research assistantship at USF.
