PROFESSOR, STUDENT AUTHOR PAPER

Psychology professor David Gorfein will read a technical paper, research for which was done during the past year on campus, at a meeting of the Psychonomic Society in Chicago tomorrow. (Friday, October 27) The society, made up of experimental psychologists, will hear Dr. Gorfein read the paper, entitled "Analysis of Free Recall Over Multiple Trials," representing an account of part of the work he has done during the past year under a grant from the National Science Foundation. The paper deals primarily with human memory and recounts experimentation on the subject accomplished by giving a series of tests to 32 undergraduates. This is the fourth paper Dr. Gorfein has written under this particular grant. Listed as a co-author of the paper is Raymond Bennett, now a graduate student in psychology at the University of Michigan under a National Science

Foundation Grant. Ray was a member of the New College first charter class and was graduated last July. Ray will be present at the national meeting to hear Dr. Corfein read the paper. The two are working together on additional research projects.

COLLEGE GIVEN RATING

A national college rating system, published by an independent national firm, has put New College high on the list of private liberal arts colleges. College-Rater used a series of valuations based on such factors as class rank and Scholastic Aptitude Test scores of entering students; number of recipients of major national fellowships such as Danforth, Woodrow Wilson and National Science Foundation; proportion of recent graduates entering graduate school; proportion of faculty with doctorates; student-faculty ratio, and library collection. From these factors, C-R made a scale on which a perfect score would be 1122 points. No college or university achieved this total, but Harvard was rated first nationally with a score of 984.

Although most of the other institutions had been founded for many years, giving them time to build libraries, establish reputations, and to have all of the benefits of longevity and stability, the score of 778 given to New College was sufficient to have it rated first among Florida colleges and universities, fifth among those in the 9-state South Atlantic region behind such

institutions as Johns Hopkins, Duke, Davidson and Emory, and in the national list of privately supported institutions, New College was ranked 36th behind leader Harvard, but still way up the list of some 377 institutions which were rated. The rating system made no evaluations or other interpretations of its measurements, but only numerically ranks them according to its system. Information for the rating, said the publishers, came from data supplied by the institutions checked against other sources.
