STUDENTS MEET WITH GOVERNOR

Two New College students, Steve Hendricks and Laurence Alexander, have been invited to meet with Governor Claude Kirk Jr. and to attend the Governor's Conference on Youth, to be held in Tampa on May 31. Both were invited because of their familiarity with student affairs as members of the Student Executive Committee, the governing body of New College undergraduates.

In extending his invitation, Gov. Kirk said that the delegates "will explore and suggest ways of meeting the many problems facing youth today.

"We believe they have the maturity and intelligence to accept responsibility and contribute considerably to society. The Conference will be run for, and by, young people," Gov. Kirk promised.

PROFESSOR'S BOOK PUBLISHED

A new book by Dr. Willard C. Humphreys Jr., associate professor of philosophy at New College, has been published by Freeman, Cooper & Company. Called "Anomalies and Scientific Theories," the book is described by the publisher as a "bridge between studies in the history of science

and in the philosophy of science, focusing on the logical and genetic roles of anomalies in the growth of physical knowledge. Its central thesis is that understanding of the logical structure and historical evolution of explanations in modern physics can only be achieved by analyzing the way in which anomalies are detected and dealt with in actual scientific practice."

Dr. Humphreys, who was graduated from Allegheny College and went on to earn masters degrees at Indiana and Yale University and a doctorate at Yale, has a special interest in the history of physics, and the philosophical and logical problems of explanation and prediction, especially in the physical sciences.

In the same announcement that included Dr. Humphrey's book, there is also announced a book by another New College professor, A. J. Ayer. His New College is the one at Oxford, though, and his book is on a philosophical subject, "The Origins of Pragmatism."

CHAIRMAN IN PUERTO RICO

Dr. Arthur R. Borden Jr., chairman of the Division of Humanities as well as professor/literature, leaves for Puerto Rico tomorrow (Friday) where for four days he will be serving with the College Entrance Examination Board as a consultant in the training of readers for advanced level tests in Spanish, mathematics, and English. For the first time, starting on May 27, the College Board is going to hold readings of examinations in Puerto Rico with teachers from the colleges and secondary schools of that commonwealth.

Dr. Borden has long been associated with the College Board in such positions as a member of the Examining Committee of the Writing Sample, the English Achievement Test, and the Advanced Placement Examinations, and as chief reader of the Advanced Placement Examinations in English and the English Achievement Test.
