GLADYS HEADS FOR TAMPA BAY

Hurricane Gladys is due to hit the Tampa Bay area sometime this afternoon. The delay in her arrival was caused by a sudden slackening of velocity. The longer Gladys remains in the Gulf, the greater will be the tides she brings. The highest winds in the hurricane are now at 90 miles per hour.

FACULTY APPROVES ADMISSION OF STUDENTS TO FACULTY MEETINGS

At its meeting yesterday, the faculty approved the petition for student representation at faculty meetings. The faculty felt that the College Council, however, should decide upon the mode of representation and consult with the faculty on their decision. According to Willard Humphreys, faculty liaison to the Student Executive Committee, faculty opinion in general favors somewhere between three and six students at the meetings. Humphreys also said that all decisions should be subject to consultation with President Elmendorf.

SLOTT TALKS TO SEC ABOUT CAPITAL CAMPAIGN

Jonathan Slott, Director of the School's \$10, million Capital Campaign, addressed the Student Executive Committee meeting last night. The Capital Campaign will get underway November 7. Six million dollars of the fund will be allotted to "brick and mortar," i.e., the physical growth of the school, and the other 4 million would be considered "endowment and expendable funds" to aid the maintenance and expansion of the faculty, scholarship and student loan funds, a computer fund, and other expenditures. \$1,225,000 will be allocated for scholarships.

ANN SCOTT TO SPEAK ON "STUDENTS AND EDUCATION"

Mrs. Andrew Scott, Assistant Professor of History at Duke University and a Danforth Foundation lecturer, will visit campus this week-end and will speak Saturday evening on "Students and Education."
